Events have rather overtaken the Secretary and the Newsletter this year - the former was expecting to produce the latter in September, but was without a report of the Annual General Meeting. So here it is - two for the price of less than one because the Treasurer's comments in his 1970 Report have also been heeded and a more economical, but, it is hoped, no less acceptable form adopted.

The opportunity has also been taken of including some more topical news previous Newsletters included reports on the Session before the one in which the Newsletter was published - this one does so too, but also includes reports on the current Session. With all the advantages of lower postage costs and up to date news, this publication date will be adhered to in future years if members agree at this year's A.G.M.

1972 REUNION

The 1972 Reunion weekend will be held on the weekend 21-22 July and will follow the usual pattern, as shown by the programme on the opposite page.

The only slight variation is the method of booking: bookings for residence and the C.H.A. Annual Dinner should be made direct with the C.H.A., while bookings for events administered by Convocation (i.e. the visit to Bath University of Technology on 21 July and lunch on 22 July) should be made direct with the Registrar, at Senate House, Bristol, BS8 1TH.

It is almost certain that there will be a limit on the number whom Bath University can accommodate on Friday evening, so applications will be accepted on a first come first served basis. Transport will be provided from Bristol.

The guest of honour at the Churchill Dinner will be Sir Philip Morris. As usual the dress is dinner jacket or lounge suit.

The Assocaition will meet the cost of accommodation and functions for members (but not their guests) who left in 1962 or 1967. It is hoped that the numbers taking advantage of this will again show an increase, and that there will be an overwhelmingly large response from those who left in other years also, particularly as this is, as noted elsewhere, something of a retirement party for the Hall's first Warden and the Association's first President.

WARDEN'S LETTER 1970-71

The five-year plan for reunion dinners pleased everyone except the Treasurer and promises well for the future. Members of the 1961 and 1966 vintage could be sure of meeting friends and there were enough from other years to ensure that noone felt isolated. Next year there should be large contingents from 1962 and 1967 and many others who have enjoyed previous parties and remembered to book the date in time.

Members returning after ten years noticed few changes. The buildings mellow and the trees flourish but the only obvious change is the conversion of the Holmes kitchen garden into a discreet and very useful car park. More kitchen gardens, in Claverton and Waltham, will soon be growing grass instead of rhubarb and onions - a more attractive crop and cheaper to maintain. We have lost - and should welcome news of - The Holmes weather-vane; and are about to lose the Claverton conservatory, which is being taken down before it falls on someone.

The most interesting changes are less noticeable. After long discussions the old House Committee is replaced by a new Hall Committee with six elected members from the J.C.R., two from S.C.R., and two each from Senate as well as Council, with the Domestic Bursar and other ex-officio members. Hall

Committee reports to a Halls Management Committee and is represented on an Accommodation Committee concerned with all forms of residence. There will be a significant number of student representatives at all levels and student members should feel fully responsible and informed.

The Association is also changing and is very actively involved in providing increased amenities in the Hall.

Some changes are entirely regrettable. Mr. Walker, after a gallant struggle against increasing illness, relapsed and died. Mr. Handford also had medical problems and moved to a job nearer his home. Miss Slader became Mrs. Gillett and eventually left us in the Summer and Miss Trebess left for another post. Nobody, of course, is indispensible but we shall miss people whose efficiency and cheerfulness have made the Hall run smoothly in spite of difficulties.

Messrs. Dugdale and Livingston will be particularly missed by the S.C.R. and by residents in G and D Houses but will still be in Bristol. I hope to follow their example before long and have two or three years as a full-time academic before retirement: but this is not yet organised and in any case I expect to be in Bristol for some years - and always interested in Churchill Hall and its members, past and present. Meanwhile I am very pleased to hear from past members all over the world and delighted to have this occasion to send my good wishes to all.

J.C.R. PRESIDENT'S LETTER 1970-71

The year started well with a very friendly atmosphere in Presco week, and Churchill abandoned the "Coffee Dance" for a "Coming-up Dance" which was a great success.

I like to think that the good start to the Session helped set the mood of quiet change which continued throughout the year. J.C.R. meetings were always well attended, but the "usual" debate on formal meals was replaced by one on informal meal dress, which led to acceptable proposals. Other rule changes made now allow guests to be legally entertained until 2 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday mornings, and first years to have cars.

But changes affecting all the Halls have now been agreed. As mentioned elsewhere, the structure of University Committees concerned with accommodation is being changed. I hope that not all the experience of the old House Committee will be lost, and I do thank them for their service since the Hall started. Less formally, Hall Presidents and Wardens now meet at least once a term in meetings which are useful in removing misunderstandings and possible causes of friction and also in such small things as getting a reciprocal meals scheme started between all Halls.

Churchill and Manor this year produced "O What A Lovely War!" A musical requires a lot more effort than an ordinary play, and I think all concerned should be congratulated on the production.

I am told that the Hall Ball was the most successful Ball in Bristol this year. It was also the most formal - perhaps this has something to do with it. The congratulations I received should really go to the people who organised it so well and to the stewards who many guests thought were professionals.

Rag this year concentrated more on results and less on publicity, and if the object of Rag is helping others, this was surely achieved. An Adventure Playground in Stockwood was built entirely by Churchillians, and another had quite a lot of Churchill volunteers working on it.

We have many Union officers in Hall - for these and for all the people who took part in Hall this has been an active year. It has been relatively quiet, but I hope, constructive. I would like to thank all those who made my job so easy, but particularly Chris Nix, the J.C.R. Treasurer. I must thank too, you, the Assocaition, not just for printing this, not just for a very enjoyable weekend, but for existing. A Hall is its members, not only its present members, but with an atmosphere made by all those who have gone before.

On a personal note may I record the large number of friends I have made at the last two C.H.A. annual weekends. I look forward to seeing them again and meeting more members of the Association in the future.

J.C.R. PRESIDENT'S LETTER 1971-72

In the face of the popular notion of student unrest, Churchill Hall's peaceful record over the past year must make very unsuual (if unexciting) reading. The only threat to Hall life was the temporary removal of Sir Winston's portrait, which has now returned to its place of honour, after having enjoyed Rag Week somewhere in FGH Block, so it is rumoured.

Beneath the apparent tranquility, the year 1971-72 has brought considerable change. Once more the Union extended the olive branch of friendship by arranging informative propaganda visits by Union officers after J.C.R. meetings. At the time of writing, however, the recurring problem of ailing washing machines is still taking priority over offers of Union "co-operation" with our J.C.R. officers as they face the task of dealing with such bodies as the University. The old J.C.R. Committee has been replaced by a Hall Committee, on which both Student members and the remnants of the old House Committee sit. Purely J.C.R. matters are now handled by an entirely student-run J.C.R. committee, and the new arrangements have, so far, worked well.

Of more interest to all students, not to mention visitors, is the installation of a new Bar, which has done much to augment student comradship and bar income. The potential of the new Hall Bar was quickly realized by the University, which responded with approval for the plans, and an offer to contribute towards the cost. We are equally grateful to the Churchill Hall Association for their financial assistance, which has considerably eased the headaches of the J.C.R. Treasurer.

Because of the glorious legacy thus being left for 1972-1973, and the advantages of not being President with final degree examinations to contend with, the reins of government were handed over early in the Summer Term. Whatever may be said in next year's magazine, I am grateful to the J.C.R. officers and to the Warden for their tireless co-operation. I sincerely hope that my successor receives as much assistance, and that he is fortunate enough to have another intake of peace loving freshers.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

It appears that the 1971 A.G.M. showed that the Secretary is not completely indispensible as it was held in his absence. In his absence, he was urged to further pursue the possibility of altering the date of the Reunion weekend to mid-June. The first "worthwhile project in the Hall" which came up for consideration as being worthy of receiving a £25 grant under the terms of the resolution passed last year was the purchase of camp beds or rubber mattresses, and it was agreed that the incoming President of the J.C.R. should make the choice.

The Treasurer presented his report as shown on pages 8 and 9, and he was duly thanked.

The question of Alumni subscriptions was discussed - the motion put to the Alumni A.G.M. was printed in last year's Newsletter - and it was reported that an amendment had been passed which gave Hall Associations the option of paying to Alumni £1 for each life member of the Hall Association which would buy that member seven year's membership of Alumni. At the end of the seven years the member can pay £1.50 to become a life member of Alumni. It was agreed that this option should be taken up by C.H.A.

The other item of unusual business was that it was proposed that C.H.A. should lend the J.C.R. £250 interest free for ten years, in order to help build a bar. After some (comparatively) heated discussion it was agreed that the Treasurer should negotiate with the J.C.R. Treasurer.

As usual the Officers were re-elected, with the substitution of Tim Keeley for John Townsend.

These accounts do not show the expenditure on the 1971 newsletter which was late being published. It is recommended that in order to save postage, the newsletter should be distributed at the same time as the circular advertising the Reunion weekend.

The "free weekend" scheme is reflected in the increase in the loss on the Reunion weekend which rose from £58.40 in 1970 to £73.92 in 1971. Fourteen members took advantage of this privilege, compared with hine members in 1970.

As reported last year, our funds will come under increasing pressure in future with inflation expected to continue at a much higher level in the 1970s. Alumni will in future receive £1 per new member instead of 75p. Accordingly it is recommended that new members should be asked to pay £7 instead of the current £5. It is also recommended that £2,000 currently invested in the Huddersfield Building Society should be invested in a Unit Trust.

These accounts do not show the expenditure on the 1970 newsletter which was late being published. The cost of publishing was £147.23 compared with £77.92 for 1969. The number printed rose from 1200 to 1350, but the cost per copy rose from 4.71p to 7.22p. Postal charges also increased. The accounts do not show the portion of the 1969/70 subscriptions payable to Alumni. This will be paid in 1971.

The "free weekend" scheme is reflected in the increase in the loss on the Reunion weekend which rose from £27. 17. 0d. in 1969 to £58. 7. 11d. in 1970. Nine members took advantage of this privilege.

With inflation continuing unchecked our funds will come under increasing pressure in the years ahead. In the absence of an increase in the cost of life membership which has remained unchanged since the Association was founded, ways of economising on our main item of expense, the newsletter, will have to be found if the Association is to devote any of its resources to other expenditures.
